Vecinos y Amigos Phillips exhibition explores a tsa Member's work with hispanic models

Bert Phillips' life in Taos is well known. In the summer of 1898, he and fellow student Ernest Blumenschein came to Taos on a painting trip, a legendary event that marks the origin of the Taos Society of Artists (TSA). He married and remained in the town until shortly before his death in 1956.

Vecinos y Amigos: Bert Geer Phillips and His Neighbors, on view through February 28 at The Lunder Research Center (LRC), instead seeks to expand our knowledge of the context of his paintings in which people in the Hispanic community modeled. "We aimed to identify them and to enrich Bert's stories with theirs," said Davison Koenig, executive director and curator. "And we're fortunate that it's also a beautiful show featuring some of his best work, plus key objects and archival material."

Guest Curator James C. Moore, PhD, noted, "These paintings are not portraits as such, but imaginative tableaux in which people served as actors in stories that Phillips felt would have success in broadening his reputation on the exhibition circuit." He said Phillips also kept in mind that his buyers were part of a mainstream US public fascinated by, but largely ignorant of, the cultures of the American Southwest.

When he first arrived in Taos, Phillips exhibited bigotry toward many of his neighbors, famously helping to

provoke a deadly riot when he refused to remove his hat for a religious procession on the street. In time, "He learned to appreciate the area's cultural milieu and foster more respectful relationships," Koenig said.

"Paintings of Hispanic subjects are rare within the work of the TSA," Moore said. "Research into the models' families and recognition of who they were allows a new understanding of Bert's working method and greater insight into how paintings were conceived to fit the existing market—and appeal to the stereotypes held by potential buyers."

"Knowing these people gives significance to those who have long been anonymous, broadening our view of the larger social dynamic of Taos," Koenig said. He lauded CSHS Site Coordinator Jake Cisneros, archive staff, and members of the organization's Hispano Advisory Council for their additional research into the models, their descendants, Phillips's life, and his paintings, including objects depicted in them.

Koenig concluded, "Their work has broadened the scope of The Lunder Research Center here on our campus, and is a perfect illustration of the kind of enrichment of narratives that we aim for."

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THE GROWTH OF OUR INVESTMENTS

Dear friends,

As the Virginia creeper vines begin to blush on the Couse House portal, it is time to reflect on the events of the year, while looking toward the horizon.

La Luz de Taos 2024 in June was our most successful gala to date, raising \$285,000 in unrestricted funds to

support programming. Even more important, thanks to the support of our artist, gallery, and publication friends, the exhibition generated national media attention, broadening our reach and moving us closer to financial sustainability.

The success of The Lunder Research Center continues to shape our mission, exhibitions, collecting, and archival focus as well as our educational outreach. Through research and community collaboration, we provide context for the paintings of the Taos Society of Artists and other early artists of Taos and give voice to these stories. The result is new scholarship, exhibitions, and educational programming. Together, we **tell a more complex and nuanced story** of our shared national identity and history.

Our exhibition Vecinos y Amigos: Bert Geer Phillips and His Neighbors, guest-curated by Jim Moore as an exploration of the artist's paintings featuring Hispano people, is a prime example of the shifting lens in scholarship, where we are focusing more on the subject matter rather than the artist. This is the first exhibition to focus on Phillips's Hispano subjects and to reach out to descendants of the identified models, delving into the relationships and social dynamics at work—and in the process foreground the people and their unique experiences as Nuevomexicanos.

Other examples of our dynamic exhibition and programming include the Plein Air Painters of America annual exhibition titled **Out West**, which closed out 2023. We started 2024 with an exhibition of student photography in cooperation with Taos Pueblo Day School called **Through the Lens**, working with 5th and 6th graders. After La Luz de Taos, we opened **Julius Rolshoven: A Cosmopolitan in Taos**, then collaborated with the Taos Abstract Artist Collective exploring the role of place with the exhibition **On Which It Rests**.

Thanks to our **continually growing network** of generous friends, archival material, art, ephemera, and books continue to be donated to the Site to expand our knowledge and understanding and augment the visitor experience. I thank everyone who has invested in us over these many years. With the launch of the Taos Society of Patrons and the Taos Legacy Society, I ask you to consider increasing your long-term investment with us so that we may achieve true financial sustainability and institutional longevity.

On August 20, CSHS held a "Lunch and Learn" event for our volunteer corps. Collections and Archives Specialist Lucas McDaniel presented a lecture on the life of **Ben Lujan**, one of E. I. Couse's primary models and friends, to about 40 volunteers and guests in the 1915 Sharp Studio. The presentation was followed by a catered luncheon in the Couse Garden, underwritten by a gift from Jennifer and Charles Sands, and a door prize giveaway. "Without our **amazing** volunteers to give tours, staff open houses, work at events like the gala, catalog books, and do a dozen other tasks, CSHS could not present the level of educational activities and services we do," said Executive Director Davison Koenig. "We are eternally grateful for their cheerful support."

CSHS thanks outgoing board member Kristin Bender of Denver and Taos for her nine years of service. Kristin ended her final term in June and remains a member of the Development Committee and a key supporter. 

Art lovers who attended the La Luz de Taos art preview and reception at Couse-Sharp Historic Site on June 14 were treated to a spectacular full rainbow, a fitting kickoff to a colorful weekend of art and fun. The two-day series of events came at the end of a two-month exhibition of 60 works by 50 artists in media including painting, sculpture, ceramics, glass, printmaking, jewelry and textiles.

As well as the preview and party, attendees had the opportunity to tour the historic site and the *Julius Rolshoven: A Cosmopolitan in Taos* exhibition, learn from a lecture at the Harwood Museum of Art by Dr. Marie Watkins on Rolshoven, and participate in the draw sale and secret-bid auction during the gala at El Monte Sagrado Resort.

For those interested in buying retail, a "trunk sale" at the gala featured a curated collection of wearable art: vintage leatherwork and silver by Foothills California, fashion by Patricia Michaels, and jewelry by Bernadette Marquez, Maria Samora, and Lyle Wright.

About 300 people attended the gala, including representatives of 45 sponsors. For the first time in the organization's history, the exhibition/gala committee was helmed by honorary chairs: Peter and Paula Lunder, renowned collectors and philanthropists, who through The Lunder Foundation of Portland, Maine, provide key support for CSHS's Lunder Research Center and Colby College Museum Fellows program.

"We firmly believe that the Couse-Sharp Historic Site is a vital resource for preserving the legacy of the Taos of Society of Artists, and hope that you will join us in supporting its programs by attending *La Luz de Taos* events and participating in the gala art sale," the Lunders stated.

The exhibition was dedicated to the memory of artist Ed Mell, a good friend of the site who passed away earlier this year, and two of Mell's works were exhibited in a place of honor on both days.
